HAS visits Stonehenge and Hadrian's Wall
Fred Kelly, our roving reporter, spent most of
September driving around the United Kingdom with his
wife, Marcia. On their journey they visited the famous
Stonehenge which was constructed in three phases
between 5,050 years ago and 3,500 years ago. The
circle of large Sarsen stones and smaller Blue stones is
very impressive and the area is surrounded by
Mesolithic burial mounds.

Fred and Marcia also spent a day retracing the Roman Emperor Hadrian's Wall, which was constructed in stone about 122 AD on the site of an earlier earth and timber wall. The Wall was constructed across Britain to keep the Barbarians in the North from raiding Roman settlements. Several impressive stretches of the Wall still remain complete with ruins of the old mile-castles.

Fred and Marcia also visited the site of the well-known Roman fort along Hadrian's Wall named Vindolanda, which dates back to around 85 AD. Remains of early timber forts are covered by stone foundations of later. more elaborate structures. The Roman Army custom of laying down a clean cover of clay or turf over demolished structures before rebuilding has created anaerobic conditions and the lack of oxygen led to the survival of almost everything that had been lost or discarded at the time. The most highly prized artifacts are slivers of wood with ink writing of official and private correspondence of the men and women who lived at Vindolanda. The Fort was occupied until the end of Roman Rule at the beginning of the fifth century and in 213 AD housed the Fourth Cohort of Gauls, 500 strong and part-mounted.

The following are the proposed changes to the HAS Constitution and the Standing Rules:

- 1. Correct 9 misspellings/typographical errors.
- 2. Article III, Section 2: Change "The action of the Board may be appealed to the membership of the Society at a special meeting." to "The action of the Board may be appealed to the membership of the Society at a regular or special meeting."
- 3. Article III, Section 5: Break into two sentences for readability.
- 4. Article IV, Section 1: Add "Officers must be members in good standing"
- 5. Article IV, Section 2: Remove "In addition, the following officers shall perform certain specific duties." This text is redundant.
- 6. Article IV, Section 2, Paragraph b.: Place second sentence first, as it describes the primary responsibility of the Vice-President.
- 7. Article IV, Section 2, Paragraph d.: Change "make all payments authorized by the President" to "make all authorized payments".
- 8. Article IV, Section 2, Paragraph d.: Add "Payment for non-budget items can be authorized by the Board, or majority vote of the members at any regular meeting.
- 9. Article IV, Section 2, Paragraph d.: Add "The fiscal year shall begin on January 1 and end December 31.
- 10. Article IV, Section 4: Remove "orally"
- 11. Article V, Section 3: Change "A meeting of the Board of Directors may be called by the President or any two members of the Board" to "The President or any two members of the Board may call a meeting of the Board of Directors" for readability.
- 12. Article VI, Section 4: Change "Twenty members" to "Ten members". The decline in attendance at regular meetings forces this change.
- 13. Article VII, Section 4: Change "whenever the President who appointed them leaves office" to "at the end of the annual meeting". This allows a reelected president to replace committee members without requiring the existing committee members to remain in their positions should an unexpected presidential vacancy occur, providing continuity for an interim president
- 14. Reword Article IX: "Each proposed constitutional amendment must be signed by two members and submitted in writing to the Secretary. The secretary shall forward the proposed amendment to the chairman of the Constitution Committee for review, and to both The Profile editor and website administrator for inclusion in The Profile and on the website. The secretary shall also provide copies of the proposed amendment and read the proposal to the members at the next regular meeting. At the next regular meeting after the proposed amendment has been read, the Constitution Committee shall make its report to the membership and the vote shall be taken. A two-thirds majority of members present and voting is required for adoption." The requested changes to this article 1) reduces the cost to the Society by allowing notification by other than U.S. mail and simplifies the written notification requirement. 2) Clarifies the two-thirds vote requirement. This makes the article a little easier to understand and the amendment process easier to manage. The only true change is doing away with the requirement to notify all members in writing. All members will still have ample opportunity to understand the proposal and make an informed decision.
